The process of finding the right place started several months ago. I did some research and Mom and I spent every weekend looking at various places. Some places would allow the cat but not the dog. Other places were too big and felt impersonal.

Everything went very smoothly and by 4 p.m. all of Mom's belongings were unpacked, the pictures were hung, and the cat and dog seemed right at home.

I realized how important it was to Mom to keep her pets with her through this transition. I personally feel having pets in our lives enriches them, and just because Mom needed to move into a different environment, she should not have to do it without the pets she has shared her life with for eight years.
