Things to prepare ahead of time for women and children: Have a suitcase packed with clothes for yourself and your children  
Toys Photo ID Birth certificates Medical cards Bank statements Extra cash (You don't want to use your bank card or credit card because they can be traced) Important phone numbers (doctors, family, friends, school, work, etc.) Phone number of the nearest battered women shelter or police station Prepaid phone card (Don't use your cell phone; it can be traced)

Talk to friends (or PAWS shelter, humane society, vet) about caring for your pets.

Needs for pets: Bag of food Litterbox Toys Vaccination records Microchip records
