

NAPPS Issues Disaster Preparedness Guide

The guide will help pet owners deal with natural and manmade disasters.

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With hurricane season affecting many parts of the country, pet owners should take some time to make emergency plans for themselves and their pets. To help pet owners cover all contingencies in case of a natural or manmade disaster, the National Association of Professional Pet Sitters (NAPPS) has put together a Disaster Preparedness Guide, available at the group's website.
